

# Village of Barrington Hills

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## 1-6-1: VILLAGE OFFICERS:

In order that the policies, regulations and ordinances of the village, as permitted by statute, are effectively discharged, there are hereby created the offices of director of administration; village clerk; village treasurer; village attorney; village engineer; chief of police; building and zoning enforcement officer; freedom of information act officer; and open meetings act officer. The village president, by and with the approval of the board of trustees, may appoint qualified persons to such offices, prescribe their terms, duties, compensation and the amount of any bond required.

## 1-6-6: VILLAGE ATTORNEY:

(A) Creation Of Office, Appointment: There is hereby created the office of village attorney. The village attorney shall be appointed by the president, by and with the approval of the board of trustees.

(B) Compensation: The compensation of the village attorney shall be fixed by the board of trustees.

### (C) Duties:

1. Written Opinions: The village attorney shall give his legal opinion in writing to the board of trustees or any member thereof, on legal questions arising under any ordinance of the village, and on legal questions and subjects in which the village shall be legally interested.

2. Attend Board Meetings: He shall attend the meetings of the board of trustees. (Ord. 69-0, 7-25-1960)

3. Other Duties: In addition to the duties herein expressly set forth or implied appertaining to this office, the village attorney shall prepare and draft any proposed ordinance requested of him by any members of the board; he shall when directed give the necessary attention to all suits and proceedings in every court of record in which the village is a party or directly interested, and he shall be the attorney and secretary of the board of local improvements; he may also serve as the attorney for the zoning board of appeals created by title 2, chapter 4 of this code, and of the plan commission created by title 2, chapter 2 of this code and such boards and commissions that from time to time may require his expertise.

### (D) Special Counsel; Appointment, Compensation, Duties:

1. Appointment: Legal counsel in addition to the village attorney may be retained at the discretion of the president.

2. Compensation: The compensation of special counsel shall be fixed by the board of trustees.

3. Duties: The duties of such special counsel may be for such purposes as the president may deem necessary or appropriate.

Skilled in every facet of the law, with a strong litigation background coupled with the practical experience of providing legal guidance to municipal entities, Mr. Bond began his legal career as an Assistant State's Attorney in DuPage County. While employed by the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office, Mr. Bond tried more than 200 cases, including in excess of 100 cases tried to verdict before juries. Mr. Bond left the State's Attorney's Office to join a firm where he devoted a substantially amount of his time representing municipal entities in tort and civil rights litigation in Federal Court. In 1992, he became a Partner with Mirabella & Kincaid, P.C., where he continued to focus his practice on representation of municipal entities. During this time, Mr. Bond was engaged by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board to provide training to corrections officers in northern Illinois, a training program he continues to provide. This year, Mr. Bond was also hired by the Illinois Sheriff's Association and the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute to provide training to Sheriff's Deputies in the conduct of civil process. In 1997, Mr. Bond and Ms. Dickson established Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C., where their



combined experience representing local governmental entities continues to garner success in representing municipal clients in federal and state courts, and representing clients on complex municipal issues.

As it does presently, should Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. be engaged as the Village Attorney, Mary Dickson will provide legal counsel to the Zoning Board of Appeals, and will remain the chief point of contact between Village officers, staff and the Firm. In addition to her 23 years of legal experience, Ms. Dickson also has a wealth of knowledge of government conduct gleaned through her service as the Public Information Officer for DuPage County, and the years spent as a working journalist reporting on matters of government concern. Since being licensed to practice law in 1991, Ms. Dickson has concentrated her practice in the representation of local governmental entities on a day to day basis, and in State and Federal Courts. While most cases are resolved through motion practice and negotiated results, Ms. Dickson has tried cases on behalf of clients in both State and Federal Courts, and before arbitration panels. She also serves as an instructor with the Illinois Police Training Institute, teaching Legal Liability on both the State and Federal levels.

**Keith E. Letsche** has been an Associate with the Firm for more than a decade, after leaving a professional career devoted to public service as an Assistant State's Attorney in the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office, and as an Assistant Attorney General under Illinois Attorney General James E. Ryan, where he was the Chief of the Land Acquisitions Bureau and Special Counsel to the Attorney General. Mr. Letsche's lengthy legal career with Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. has focused on issues arising before the DuPage County Election Commission, the Aurora Election Commission and the DuPage County Sheriff's Merit Commission, in particular. **Sean P. Conway** has been employed for five years as an Associate with Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. Mr. Conway also served as an Assistant Attorney General in the General Law Bureau of the Illinois Attorney General's Office. Mr. Conway began his legal career as a Judicial Clerk for the Honorable Sebastian T. Patti and the Honorable Joseph M. Sconza in the Circuit Court of Cook County, ruling on judicial review claims involving the Municipal Code of Chicago and the Illinois Municipal Code. Mr. Conway has significant experience representing clients before a variety of administrative tribunals, including the Illinois Labor Relations Board, Illinois Department of Human Rights, Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, Illinois Department of Employment Security, Illinois Civil Service Commission and the Illinois State Police Merit Board, among many others. With particular experience in the Illinois Open Meetings Act and the Illinois Freedom of Information Act, Mr. Conway will serve the Village as Counsel on issues related to these statutory proceedings.

**6. A description of the nature and scope of specific projects handled by each qualified attorney, or significant matters that may be relevant to representation of the Village in such disputes.**

Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. has considerable experience working with local governmental entities of all types, and specifically, municipal entities. We recognize that the Village of Barrington Hills is unique, principally for being a small (in terms of population), highly affluent community which voted to



be home rule, and which is comprised of only residential uses featuring 5-acre minimum lot zoning. Bringing its own challenges to the Village is the fact that it straddles four counties: Cook, Lake, Kane and McHenry. Even with these special qualities, however, the legal work required by the Village is much like that required of the municipalities the Firm currently represents.

We are pleased to be in our 13th year as Corporation Counsel to the City of West Chicago, and having helped to guide the City through a period of economic and physical growth, which included the transition to being a home rule community. While the City has a significantly larger population, 27,086, with different socioeconomic composition, it has required legal services typical of a home rule community such as Barrington Hills. In addition to day-to-day legal services, such as review of contracts, personal issues, licenses and leases, and the drafting of required Ordinances and Resolutions, during the Firm's tenure we have provided the legal services required to assist the City in a redevelopment of the downtown area, and growth areas along Illinois Route 59. Such services have included condemnation and negotiated acquisition of blighted properties in the Downtown Tax Increment Financing District, as well as negotiation of development agreements with businesses in town.

In 2002, the Firm was appointed Corporation Counsel to the City of Wood Dale. This working class community boasts a mix of zoning, which brings a wealth of housing and business options to its residents. Over the years of our representation, we have worked closely with the City's Community Development Commission and the City Council to implement its Unified Development Ordinance in this older community. Of significant concern to the City currently is its ability to provide an economical environment for its residents, approximately 40% of whom are aged 45 and older. This concern informs decisions made on such projects as the construction of a new approximately \$9 million wastewater treatment plant and plans to revitalize the City's downtown area. Here, the Firm has been integrally involved in contract negotiation and land acquisition.

More recently, in 2009, Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. assumed representation of the Village of Bensenville. At the time of engagement, the Village was involved in significant, multimillion dollar litigation with the City of Chicago over the expansion of O'Hare International Airport. In addition to litigation with the City, the Village also was a party to several other technically involved cases, and the legal fees expended on prior counsel were draining the Village of resources required to provide needed essential services to its residents. Under new leadership, and with our assistance, the Village resolved its litigation with the City of Chicago, with the negotiated payment of \$16 million by the City to the Village, and allocation of an additional million dollars in soundproofing work for the Village's residents. The Firm also successfully resolved all other pending cases. The monies generated by the cessation of litigation have been directed instead to much needed infrastructure projects which included millions in needed roadwork and the current construction of a new wastewater treatment plant. While the opening of new runways at O'Hare continues to be a concern for the Village and its residents, the Firm continues to work with Village leaders on effective, cost-conscious solutions. The challenges of the proximity of the Village to the Airport required the Firm to assist in the drafting of certain advisory referenda questions which will appear on the November 2014 Ballot, and to work with Federal and State legislators to achieve solutions for the residents of Bensenville.



In addition to currently representing these municipal entities, Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. represents a number of other governmental entities, including election authorities, townships, park districts and fire protection districts. While different from municipalities based on their statutory structure, each of these entities have a commonality in the manner in which they operate as governmental bodies. All of our representation of our current and former clients will benefit the relationship we hope to form with the Village of Barrington Hills.

The Village of Barrington Hills provides legal issues and challenges similar to those of other Bond, Dickson & Associates, P.C. Municipal Clients. In fact, the day-to-day requirements of municipal law remain the same, no matter where the governmental entity is located, or the number or nature of the residents who comprise the Village.

While each of the Attorneys with the Firm share legal attributes in common, each also has specific experience to provide guidance in the following areas:

**Patrick K. Bond** – Municipal Law and Litigation. Mr. Bond has been providing legal assistance to municipal and local governmental entities since first being engaged in the practice of law. He serves as the principal attorney to the Firm's Municipal Clients, attending Board and Council meetings, and providing legal guidance to key municipal staff members. This experience will aid the Village on all election matters.

**Mary E. Dickson** – Civil Litigation, Land Acquisition, Land Use. Ms. Dickson represents Firm clients in both State and Federal Courts, and provides oversight on all litigation in which the Firm Clients are involved. Additionally, she will provide guidance to the Village on zoning, development and land management issues, guidance she currently provides to the Firm Clients.
